Draft Law “On amending law no. 25/2024 On Cyber Security”

On June 23, 2026, the National Cyber Security Authority (NCSA), submitted for public consultation the draft law “On amending law no. 25/2024 On Cyber Security” (the **Draft Law**).

The Draft Law aims to reinforce protections for critical and important information infrastructures while strengthening national capacity to detect, respond to, and mitigate cybersecurity incidents.

The proposed amendments are fully harmonized with Directive (EU) 2022/2555 of the European Parliament and of the Council of 14 December 2022 on measures for a high common level of cybersecurity across the Union, amending Regulation (EU) No 910/2014 and Directive (EU) 2018/1972, and repealing Directive (EU) 2016/1148 (NIS 2 Directive).

The proposed amendments are structured around the following core pillars:

Institutional Changes

The Draft Law establishes the **Interinstitutional Cyber Intelligence Group**, a mechanism designed to facilitate information sharing, threat analysis, and strategic coordination among institutions responsible for cybersecurity and national defense.

Also, the provisions of the Draft Law expand the NCSA's mandate to include centralized procurement of cybersecurity training and authorization of conformity assessment bodies, while refining the operational structure of sectoral Computer Security Incident Response Teams (CSIRTs) to improve coordination at both sectoral and national levels.

New Compliance Obligations

Operators of critical and important information infrastructures will be required to submit self-declarations attesting to implemented cybersecurity measures, serving as a preliminary compliance-monitoring tool for regulators. Operators must also disclose the hosting and administration arrangements of their information systems, networks, and infrastructures, increasing transparency and regulatory oversight of the entities underpinning critical services.

In addition, operators must implement measures to block, filter, restrict, or neutralize Indicators of Compromise (IOCs), Indicators of Attack (IOAs), and vulnerabilities communicated by the NCSA reflecting a shift toward proactive rather than reactive cyber defense.

Certification and Enforcement

The Draft Law reinforces the cybersecurity certification framework by formalizing authorization procedures for conformity assessment bodies and promoting the use of certified ICT products, services, and processes aligned with national and EU certification schemes.

Moreover, the scope of administrative offences is broadened to cover failures to provide required information, submit self-declarations, disclose hosting arrangements, or implement NCSA-mandated measures, backed by a strengthened sanctions regime.

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
